During a spring 2021 clean up, approximately 600 pounds of trash were collected. The EAC is working to partner with local schools and has worked with various other community partners.

During this reporting period, PCSM BMPs were installed at 51 Washington (NPDES Permit No PAD460038 2 rain gardens, 1 underground detention basin, water quality filters, and porous pavement), Maston Mill (NPDES Permit No PAD460053, 1 rain garden, water quality filters), 7 Tower Bridge (NPDES Permit No PAG02004615003 subsurface infiltration basin, inlet filters), and SORA West (NPDES Permit No PAC460275 1 underground detention basin, 1 bio-filtration basin, 1 rain garden, green roof, and media filters) to satisfy PCSM requirements for earth disturbance activities under Chapter 102. PCSM BMPs were previously installed as part of the Londonbury at Millenium, Grande at Riverview, and Riverwalk at Millennium developments to satisfy PCSM requirements for earth disturbance activities under Chapter 102.

ENGINEERING

We each have our own lawn care style, some are protective, while others take a more laid back approach. No matter your style, there are ways to reduce the environmental impact of your lawn care practices. Overwatering is not only bad for your lawn, it's a strain on water supplies and often ends up as wasted, excess runoff to the Borough's storm sewer system and streams.



Watering Your Lawn

Light, frequent watering supports healthy grass and resists disease and pests. The best schedule for watering is 15 - 20 minutes per day between noon and 4:00 PM when the grass is under the most stress. If daily afternoon watering is not practical for you, try an everyother-day schedule of 30 - 40 minutes. For best results, combine light, frequent watering with grass mulching and slow-release fertilizer applications.

Grass Mulching Tips!

- Mow High! Set the mower blade at the highest setting, leaving grass blades three (3) inches tall. If you cut your grass at two (2) inches or less, the grass will draw energy from its root reserves to grow, instead of drawing energy from the sun. Tall grass encourages deep roots, which require less water, and also shades out crabgrass and low-growing weeds. Keeping grass tall during the summer also helps the plants tolerate the heat and dry weather, rather than requiring more water.
- Let your clippings lay. Let the grass blades fall back onto the lawn. Short clippings quickly decompose, adding valuable nutrients to the soil. Grass clippings can return 50-100% of the nitrogen your lawn needs and are free fertilizers. If you are concerned about the appearance of lawn clippings, you can use a mulching mower, which will chop them into fine bits. Another bonus? Grass clippings are 85% water and can also reduce your watering needs.
- A common myth is that grass clippings cause thatch, a layer of living and dead roots and stems growing between the green layer and the soil. Troublesome thatch is actually caused by improper use of lawn chemicals, compacted soils, and excessive watering.
- Fertilizing Your Lawn. In the case of fertilizer, more is not better! Over-applied fertilizer will wash off your lawn when it rains, drain into the Borough's storm sewer system and ultimately end up in streams as a pollutant. A soil test will tell you what nutrients are already contained in your lawn so that you are not over-applying fertilizers. Soil testing is available through the local county Penn State Extension office: https://extension.psu.edu/soil-testing.

ZONING SERVICES

What Residents Should Know About Zoning Permits

There are certain types of property improvements, which do not require a Building Permit, but do require a Zoning Permit. The Zoning Ordinance regulates the installation of residential fences, retaining walls, the installation of sheds, and the installation of parking pads, patios, driveways, and sidewalks within residential lots. Some requirements to be aware of are:

- **Residential fences** may not exceed six (6) feet in height; must be set back two (2) feet from an alley; and may not be located between the front wall of a dwelling and the street it faces.
- **Residential storage sheds** may be located in the rear yard of properties. The shed must be set back three (3) feet from property lines unless there is an alley, in which case it must be set back five (5) feet from the alley. A shed must be 10 feet from the residence. Sheds not greater than 125 square feet are not considered in the permitted built area or impervious coverage on a lot. If a shed is larger than 125 square feet, it may not increase the area of buildings on the lot beyond 35% of the lot's area, or 60% of the impervious coverage (areas that water cannot go through including buildings, sidewalks, parking pads, etc.) on a lot.



• **Patios, parking pads, and sidewalks** other than the public sidewalk may not cause the impervious coverage on the lot to exceed 60%. Should the owner of a property choose to use porous pavers or other porous material; only half of the area to be covered will be counted as impervious.

The application for a Zoning Permit can be found on the Borough's web site, www.conshohockenpa.gov. A site plan showing the location of a fence, or the location and measurements of buildings and other impervious areas must be submitted with the Permit application. The permit fee is a flat fee of \$50.00; and permits require one to two weeks to process. HOUSING REHABILITATION PROGRAM



EQUAL HOUSING

The Borough of Conshohocken's Housing Rehabilitation Program has recently received funding from the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development HOME Program and Community Development Block Grant Program.

Conshohocken's Housing Rehabilitation Program has been in existence for over four decades. During that time the Program has assisted hundreds of Conshohocken homeowners in bringing their homes into code conformance, which enables more comfortable and safe living conditions. On average the Program completes four (4) to seven (7) properties per year.

Roof repair, window and door replacements, electrical upgrades, sidewalk repair, as well as handicap accessibility, are some of the items the Program can provide to eligible single-family homeowners. The Program now is a four-year Deferred Loan Program, which declines by 25% each year.

Housing Rehabilitation Income Guidelines

Your income must be below the following limits and includes salary, pension, Social Security, child support, and interest on assets:

Other Requirements:

- You must be a Borough of Conshohocken resident.
- You must own and occupy a single-family residence.
- Your taxes and sewer fees must be current.

There are further increases in income limits based on additional family members. The Housing Rehabilitation Program provides one-time assistance only. If the program has provided services in the past, additional work on the same property is not permitted.

Parents' Guide to Online Safety

The Internet is an integral part of our lives. We can easily access games, entertainment, information, and communicate with our friends and family with the touch of a button. Children are exposed to the Internet at younger and younger ages through school assignments, Smart TVs, cell phones, tablets and gaming. These apps and platforms allow kids to chat and message in real time while playing games. It is important to take steps to ensure your child's activities do not lead them to online dangers with real world repercussions.

Talk to your child about the importance of online safety. Stay involved with online activities by monitoring the games, platforms and online users your child interacts with. Keep a list of all usernames and passwords your child uses so you can access and monitor their accounts. We also advise parents and guardians to become familiar with the parental controls built in to most games and apps. They can allow you to filter and block content you don't want your children to have access to. Below are some basic online safety tips for children.

- Follow the family rules, and those set by the Internet service provider.
- Never post or trade personal pictures.
- Never reveal personal information, such as address, phone number, or school name or location.
- Use only a screen name and don't share passwords (other than with parents).
- Never agree to get together in person with anyone met online without parent approval and/or supervision.
- Never respond to a threatening email, message, post, or text.
- Always tell a parent or other trusted adult about any communication or conversation that was scary or hurtful.

Basic guidelines for parental supervision:

- Spend time online together to teach your kids appropriate online behavior.
- Keep the computer in a common area where you can watch and monitor its use, not in individual bedrooms. Monitor any time spent on smartphones or tablets.
- · Bookmark kids' favorite sites for easy access.
- Check your credit card and phone bills for unfamiliar account charges.
- Find out what, if any, online protection is offered by your child's school, after-school center, friends' homes, or any place where kids could use a computer without your supervision.
- Take your child seriously if he or she reports an uncomfortable online exchange.

Watch for warning signs of a child being targeted by an online predator. These can include:

- Spending long hours online, especially at night
- Phone calls from people you don't know
- Unsolicited gifts arriving in the mail
- Your child suddenly turning off the computer when you walk into the room
- Withdrawal from family life and reluctance to discuss online activities

Home & Fire Safety:

The Conshohocken Fire Department has noticed an increase in electrical house fires due to misuse of power strips. It is important to use power strips correctly. Never use multiple extension cords in one outlet. Overloading outlets, circuits and extension cords by plugging too many things into one area can cause an electrical fire. Avoid potential fires by following these safety tips below.

Electric and Appliances:

- Check to ensure that all electrical cords are in good condition and are not broken or cut.
- Clean the lint from your dryer after every use.
- · Check to see if all plug outlets are safe and do not feel warm when you touch them. If they are warm, call an electrician.

Smoke Alarms:

- Put smoke alarms on every level of the home.
- Put smoke alarms inside and outside sleeping areas.
- Test smoke alarms each month.
- Change smoke alarm batteries as needed.
- Make sure smoke alarms are less than 10 years old.

Carbon Monoxide Alarms:

- Put carbon monoxide alarms on each level of the home.
- Make sure carbon monoxide alarms are less than 7 years old.

Fireworks Safety

As Fourth of July celebrations approach, residents are reminded to use caution when interacting with fireworks. Fireworks, and/or sparklers can cause fires, burns, dismemberment or death if handled improperly. Pennsylvania residents are permitted to purchase and use consumer grade fireworks that contain a maximum of 50 milligrams of explosive material. M-80's, cherry bombs, quarter sticks and any other explosive or incendiary devices with more than 50 milligrams of explosive materials and are strictly prohibited. Furthermore, the use and discharge of all display fireworks, including sparklers, is prohibited on all Borough property and parks.

Trash & Recycling Cart Updates

As of September 9, 2019 only approved containers must be used for all residential trash and recycling, unless other arrangements have been made, and approved, by the Public Services Department. Trash and recycling cans must have 2 wheels, a metal lift bar and attached lid. Unapproved containers will be tagged for no future pickups until the residence comes into compliance.

Trash Collection Rules and Regulations

- There is a limit of 4 cans/bags per household per pick-up (200 pounds maximum)
- Each can/bag is not to be heavier than 50 pounds.
- Needles, syringes, lances and other sharp objects should be placed in a metal container with a secure lid so as not to be a hazard.
- Please place your cans/bags at curbside on your property no earlier than 5:00PM the night before and your cans must be removed from curbside no later than 7:00PM the day of collection.
- No clean-outs or move-outs unless prearranged 24 hours in advance. Please call (610) 828-1092.
- No construction debris or carpet unless prearranged 24 hours in advance. Please call (610) 828-1092.
- Trash will be left curbside and 'red tagged' if deemed to be too heavy, improperly placed, or in an unapproved container. Trash that is left should be returned to the property before 7:00 PM.

Yard Waste Collection Rules and Regulations

Yard waste stickers are available at the Borough office to convert your old blue recycle bin into a container for yard waste disposal. All residences must participate in the Borough's recycling programs by separating their recyclable material from their regular trash. Yard waste is recyclable, therefore the separation and collection of this material is mandated by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and Conshohocken Borough.

- Weeds, leaves, brush and plants should be placed in biodegradable paper composting bags. Please no trash in these bags.
- Each bag should not to be heavier than 50 pounds.
- Tree branches under five (5") in diameter, not exceeding five (5') in length, are to be securely tied into bundles and should not to be heaver then 50 pounds.
- Christmas trees. No decorations, tree stands or plastic tree bags.
- Please place your bags, and/or bundles at curbside on your property no earlier than 5:00 PM the night before.

GRASS CLIPPINGS ARE NO LONGER ACCEPTED WITH YARD WASTE COLLECTION

There are several options for recycling your grass clippings, here are a few ideas:

- Leave on your lawn to act as a natural fertilizer.
- Use them to fill raised vegetable gardens or flower beds.
- Spread them as mulch around the base of trees, shrubs, or potting soil.
- · Add them to your compost pile as a source of "green" high nitrogen material.

Conshohocken Is Single Stream Recycling

Single stream recycling allows all of your recyclable materials to be placed into one recycling container. The best part is you don't have to separate them! Hence we get the term 'Single Stream Recycling.' Residents will see trash trucks collecting recyclables. Rest assured recycled materials will go to the recycling facility, NOT the trash-to-steam plant. Recycling carts should be left out before 7:00 AM on collection day, at the front edge of your property or nominated collection point.





Snow Removal

When it snows it is our goal is to clear all Borough and state roads within six to 10 hours after snow has stopped falling. Please refrain from parking on the street if you have off-street parking available. This allows Public Works to clear more snow from the road. Residents should clear their sidewalks after plowing has been completed. A three-foot-wide path on the sidewalk must be cleared on your property within 24 hours after the snow has stopped. Don't forget your crosswalks, handicapped ramps, and alley crossing. The Borough does not plow snow in alleys.

It is illegal to shovel, throw or plow snow from sidewalks onto street parking, driveways, alleys and into the street or right-of way. Dumping snow or ice on Borough property, or plowing snow across a street is also prohibited. When the Mayor declares a Snow Emergency, remember to remove your vehicle from any posted "Snow Emergency Routes." Vehicles must be removed until after the parking lanes have been completely cleared.

LICENSES & INSPECTIONS

The Licenses & Inspections Department personnel work diligently to preserve and protect the health, safety and welfare of the public throughout all facets of property ownership, residency, development, construction and business operation within Conshohocken Borough.

Frequently Asked Questions

Do I need a permit for...? Any work beyond a basic repair or a non-structural alteration may require a building permit issued by the Borough's Building Code Official for both residential and commercial properties. The best course of action is to contact the Borough at (610) 828-1092, and ask a building inspector if a permit is required for your project. Be prepared to provide a detailed scope of work for the project, and identify the property as residential or commercial. Change in use may require zoning approval.

Am I responsible for maintaining the alley behind my house? Yes. Typically, the property owners on each side of an alley are responsible to maintain to the center of the alley for the width of each respective property. This includes the alley pavement surface (e.g. potholes), as well as grass, weeds, trash, etc., that may be

found in an alley, regardless of how it ended up there. Weeds on the other side of your fence along the alley are still part of your property, and therefore your responsibility to trim and/or spray. The Borough does not plow snow in alleys.

Why does the Borough need to inspect the home I'm selling? Borough Ordinance Chapter 11, Part 1 governs Transfer of Real Estate and Real Estate Certification. Per §11-111, anyone selling a property in the Borough is responsible to certify that there are no uncorrected violations of any housing, building, zoning, and safety or fire codes. The Borough performs an inspection based on a Real Estate Certification Checklist, which was adopted by Borough Council and records any apparent violations. It is required that all violations be corrected prior to settlement, or the responsibility to correct said violations may be transferred to the buyer, who will have 12 months to complete the work. The terms of such a transfer are private and fall outside of the Borough's authority.

Where exactly is my property line? Absent physically apparent monuments or property corner pins, the Borough cannot independently verify property lines on behalf of private property owners. Property owners are encouraged to engage a Professional Land Surveyor to prepare a site plan and physically set corner markers. This information is useful for locating potential property improvements such as fences and garages, laying out additions to the primary structure, and to satisfy property line disputes, if necessary. Plans for newer homes may be available at the Borough office. File a Right-to-Know Request, and the Borough staff will search the archives.

How do I register a new rental property? Borough Ordinance Chapter 11, Part 2 governs Residential Rental License Permits. Visit the Borough website and download the Rental Packet for New Rentals from the "Forms" list under the Permits & Licenses section.

Property Maintenance & Safety

As a property owner, you are responsible for mowing, trimming and spraying, as necessary to keep your property, as well as the public street frontage, clean and safe. The illustration below highlights some of the requirements for private maintenance of public rightsof-way. The Borough has adopted an ordinance that requires house numbers on both the front and rear of houses with alley access for rental properties. This requirement will be addressed during the rental inspection and use & occupancy permit process. Stay tuned for more information. REAR HOUSE NUMBER ORDINANCE

Residential rental properties in the Borough of Conshohocken are now required to have house numbers installed and maintained on the front and rear of dwelling structures used for residential rental unit(s). The ordinance requires separate identification of each unit for structures with separate entrances for multiple units, and requires placement of the applicable house number on structures blocking visibility of the rear entrance, where applicable. The house numbers required by the ordinance must be installed before a residential rental license may be issued or renewed.

Keep Your Soil At Home

Believe it or not, one of the biggest threats to our water quality is dirt washing into our rivers from lawns, roads, driveways, and construction sites. The topsoil is an important resource for your yard. However, when the soil is lost through erosion it becomes a pollutant called "sediment." Water flowing from your yard during rain or snow melt carries sediment, and the other pollutants that attach to sediments, to our local streams.

What's Wrong with Sediment?

Sediment clouds and reduces sunlight for stream plants that provide habitat and oxygen for fish. Sediments fill in the spaces between rocks in stream bottoms and take away habitats for fish and other critters that live on the bottom. Sediment also carries other pollutants such as nutrients, oil, and grease. Excess nutrients in water lead to nuisance algae growth.

Signs of Erosion Include:

- Exposed tree roots, stones, and rocks
- Formation of small gullies
- Buildup of soil in low areas
- Widening or depending stream channels

What can you do to prevent erosion?

- Seed or mulch any bare soil on your property. Plant roots guard soil from rain drops and prevent erosion.
- Choose native plants that thrive in our climate. Native plants can grow deeper roots systems that protect soil from erosion. Check with a local nursery for information.
- Cover gardens with mulch or leaves over winter to protect plants and reduce erosion when snow melts.

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ZONING SERVICES

What Residents Should Know About Zoning Permits

There are certain types of property improvements, which do not require a Building Permit, but do require a Zoning Permit. The Zoning Ordinance regulates the installation of residential fences; retaining walls; the installation of sheds, and the installation of parking pads, patios, driveways, and sidewalks within residential lots. Some of the requirements to be aware of are as follows.

Residential fences may not exceed 6 feet in height; must be set back 2 feet from an alley; and may not be located between the front wall of a dwelling and the street it faces.

Residential storage sheds may be located in the rear yard of properties. The shed must be set back 3 feet from property lines unless there is an alley, in which case it must be set back 5 feet from the alley. A shed must be 10 feet from the residence. Sheds not greater than 125 square feet are not considered in the permitted built area or impervious coverage on a lot. If a shed is larger than 125 square feet, it may not increase the area of buildings on the lot beyond 35% of the lot's area; or 60% of the impervious coverage (areas that water cannot go through including buildings, sidewalks, parking pads, etc.) on a lot.



Patios, parking pads, and sidewalks other than the public sidewalk may not cause the impervious coverage on the lot to exceed 60%. Should the owner of a property choose to use porous pavers or other porous material; only half of the area to be covered will be counted as impervious.

The application for a Zoning Permit can be found on the Borough's web site, **www.conshohockenpa.gov**. A site plan showing the location of a fence, or the location and measurements of buildings and other impervious areas must be submitted with the Permit application. The permit fee is a flat fee of \$50.00; and permits require one to two weeks to process. *For other questions regarding Zoning Permits, contact the Borough Zoning Officer at 610-828-1092*.

HOUSING REHABILITATION PROGRAM



The Borough of Conshohocken's Housing Rehabilitation Program has recently received funding from the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development HOME Program and Community Development Block Grant Program.

The Housing Rehabilitation Program has been in existence for over four decades and has assisted hundreds of Conshohocken homeowners bring their homes into code conformance enabling them to live more comfortably and safely. Roof repair, window and door replacement, electrical upgrades, sidewalk repair, as well as handicap

accessibility, are some of the items the Program can provide to eligible single-family homeowners.

The Program is now a four-year Deferred Loan Program, which declines by twenty-five percent each year. Please know that there is no cost to the homeowner unless the home is sold within the four years.

Housing Rehabilitation Income Guidelines

Your income must be below the following limits and includes salary, pension, Social Security, child support, and interest on assets (see chart at right):

Other Requirements:

- You must be a Borough of Conshohocken resident.
- You must own and occupy a single-family residence.
- Your taxes and sewer fees must be current.
- You cannot be a Borough of Conshohocken employee.

There are further increases in income limits based on additional family members. The Housing Rehabilitation Program provides one-time assistance only. If the program has provided services in the past, additional work on the same property is not permitted.

If a rogue, un-empathetic, brutal, racist or undisciplined officer appeared in the ranks of your department, I promise you I would use my authority to get them out.

Unwanted medications and small amounts of documents for shredding can be dropped off to the police lobby during normal business hours. I can assure you that this department has rigorous policies in place regarding the use of force. Our officers are equipped with the latest less than lethal technology and we train consistently to those policies and equipment. We have all received training in sensitivity and empathy practices, commonly known as "de-escalation." We have also trained to deal with those with mental disabilities, all in an effort to minimize the use of force or otherwise negative encounters.

In an effort to maintain a positive relationship with this community, we have actively offered programs and events to establish and maintain a face-to-face relationship with residents. Examples of some of our public, communitybased events include: A Bike and Trail Safety Workshop, identity theft crime prevention, CPR classes, Coffee With A Cop, National Night Out,

participation in suicide prevention panels and discussions, our annual document shredding event, and regular outreach to our youth through the public schools.

I am blessed, as is our community, to be served by great people. I send officers out on the street everyday who chose to do a sometimes very difficult job. These officers are a direct reflection of me and carry with them my expectations, which are to make every encounter with the public a positive one. In cases where that is not possible and an arrest has to be made, it occurs within the law and our department's policies where only appropriate force is to be used.

Our authority and effectiveness as a law enforcement agency begins and ends with the support offered by our community. That relationship is a fragile existence and can be taken away with one negative incident. In other words: "we can do a thousand things right and one thing wrong and we have to begin again." Losing that faith is what keeps me awake at night. I am open to finding ways to be better and maybe that could start with you. Please know that I hear your concerns, and that we are committed to being a model of positive, professional policing.

I encourage our residents to contact me directly so I can hear your thoughts and concerns. As a 34-year veteran of this police force I take the mission of this department, and our place within this community, as a moral imperative. We will continue to strive to do better and that starts with honest dialogue and constant reflection. I promise that the Conshohocken Police Department will be a leader on both fronts.

2020-2021 Holiday Solid Waste & Recycle Collection Schedule

When a holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, it is observed on the following Monday. When your trash and recycle collection day falls on a holiday, your recyclables will be collected on Wednesday and your trash will be collected on your next scheduled collection day.

Stickers for trash cart lids are now being distributed. Public Services will work to place stickers on Borough issued cart lids while collecting trash. Each parcel of land will receive (1) sticker only.

Trash & Recycling Cart Updates

Only approved containers must be used for all residential trash and recycling, unless other arrangements have been made, and approved, by the Public Services Department. Trash and recycling cans must have 2 wheels, a metal life bar and attached lid. Unapproved containers will be tagged for no future pickups until the residence comes into compliance.

Trash Collection Rules and Regulations

- There is a limit of four (4) cans/bags per household per pick-up (200 pounds maximum)
- Each can/bag is not to be heavier than 50 pounds.
- Needles, syringes, lances and other sharp objects should be placed in a metal container with a secure lid so as not to be a hazard.
- Please place your cans/bags at curbside on your property no earlier than 5:00 PM the night before and your cans must be removed from curbside no later than 7:00 PM the day of collection.
- No clean-outs or move-outs unless prearranged 24 hours in advance. Please call (610) 828-1092.
- No construction debris or carpet unless prearranged 24 hours in advance. Please call (610) 828-1092.
- Trash will be left curbside and 'red tagged' if deemed to be too heavy, improperly placed, or in an unapproved container. Trash that is left should be returned to the property before 7:00 PM.

Conshohocken Is Single Stream Recycling

Single stream recycling allows all of your recyclable materials to be placed into one recycling container. The best part is you don't have to separate them! Hence we get the term 'Single Stream Recycling.' Residents will see trash trucks collecting recyclables. Rest assured recycled materials will go to the recycling facility, NOT the trashto-steam plant. Recycling carts should be left out before 7:00 AM on collection day, at the front edge of your property or nominated collection point.

Yard Waste Collection Rules and Regulations

Yard waste stickers are available at the Borough office to convert your old blue recycle bin into a container for yard waste disposal.

All residences must participate in the Borough's recycling programs by separating their recyclable material from their regular trash. Yard waste is recyclable, therefore the separation and collection of this material is mandated by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and Conshohocken Borough.

- Weeds, leaves, brush and plants should be placed in biodegradable paper composting bags. Please no trash in these bags.
- Each bag should not to be heavier than 50 pounds.
- Tree branches under five (5") in diameter, not exceeding five (5') length, are to be securely tied into bundles and should not be heaver then 50 pounds.
- Christmas trees. No decorations, tree stands or plastic tree bags.
- Please place your bags, and/or bundles at curbside on your property no earlier than 5:00 PM the night before.

GRASS CLIPPINGS ARE NO LONGER ACCEPTED WITH YARD WASTE COLLECTION

There are several options for recycling your grass clippings, here are a few ideas:

- Leave on your lawn to act as a natural fertilizer.
- Use them to fill raised vegetable gardens or flower beds.
- Spread them as mulch around the base of trees, shrubs, or potting soil.
- dd them to your compost pile as a source of "green" high nitrogen material.



Fall Leaf Collection

This season the Borough of Conshohocken will begin utilizing our new Swaploader for leaf collection. The addition of this new vehicle means a significant improvement to the Borough's leaf and yard waste recycling program. Along with a leaf vacuum chassis, it includes a commercial wood-chipper attachment that will eliminate the need to rent / equipment for fallen trees or limbs. It can also be used for snow plowing and salting, clearing out storm water inlets, and aiding in potential emergency type situations.

Public Works collects fall leaves beginning in October and ending in December. The fall leaf collection schedule will be posted on the Borough's website just prior to the start of collection.

Leaf Collection Rules and Regulations:

- Leaf pile may extend along the length of your entire property. Please rake your piles to the curb but not into the street.
- Do not mix limbs, brush, and other debris in the leaf piles. This may result in damage to equipment and injuries to employees.
- Adverse weather conditions may cause delays on posted leaf collection dates.
- Once the leaf-collecting machine passes it will NOT return.
- Leaves will not be collected in the trash. Trash with leaves commingled will not be collected.
- Motorists should obey the posted 'no parking' signs and be cautious on all roads during leaf collection season.

Christmas Tree Recycling

Public Works will begin collecting and recycling Christmas trees with yard waste on Wednesday, December 30, 2020. Please put used Christmas trees out on Tuesday night before Wednesday yard waste pick-up. All tree bags, ornaments, lights and stands must be removed. Collected trees are chipped and composted.

Snow Removal

When it snows it is our goal is to clear all Borough and state roads within six to 10 hours after snow has stopped falling. Please refrain from parking on the street if you have off-street parking available. This allows Public Works to clear more snow from the road. Residents should clear their sidewalks after plowing has been completed. A three-foot-wide path on the sidewalk must be cleared on your property within 24 hours after the snow has stopped. Don't forget your crosswalks, handicapped ramps, and alley crossing. The Borough does not plow snow in alleys.

It is illegal to shovel, throw or plow snow from sidewalks onto street parking, driveways, allies and into the street or right-of way. Dumping snow or ice on Borough property, or plowing snow across a street is also prohibited. When the Mayor declares a Snow Emergency, remember to remove your vehicle from any posted *"Snow Emergency Routes."* Vehicles must be removed until after the parking lanes have been completely cleared.

LICENSES & INSPECTIONS

The Licenses & Inspections Department personnel work diligently to preserve and protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public throughout all facets of property ownership, residency, development, construction and business operation within Conshohocken Borough.

Frequently Asked Questions

Do I need a permit for...? Any work beyond a basic repair or a non-structural alteration may require a building permit issued by the Borough's Building Code Official for both residential and commercial properties. The best course of action is to contact the Borough at (610) 828-1092, and ask a building inspector if a permit is required for your project. Be prepared to provide a detailed scope of work for the project, and identify the property as residential or commercial. Change in use may require zoning approval.

Am I responsible for maintaining the alley behind my house? Yes. Typically, the property owners on each side of an alley are responsible to maintain to the center of the alley for the width of each respective property. This includes the alley pavement surface (e.g. potholes), as well as grass, weeds, trash, etc., that may be found in an alley, regardless of how it ended up there. Weeds on the other side of your fence along the alley are still part of your property, and therefore your responsibility to trim and/or spray. The Borough does not plow snow in alleys.

Why does the Borough need to inspect the home I'm selling? Borough Ordinance Chapter 11, Part 1 governs Transfer of Real Estate and Real Estate Certification. Per §11-111, anyone selling a property in the Borough is responsible to certify that there are no uncorrected violations of any housing, building, zoning, and safety or fire codes. The Borough performs an inspection based on a Real Estate Certification Checklist, which was adopted by Borough Council and records any apparent violations. It is required that all violations be corrected prior to settlement, or the responsibility to correct said violations may be transferred to the buyer, who will have 12 months to complete the work. The terms of such a transfer are private and fall outside of the Borough's authority.

Where exactly is my property line? Absent physically apparent monuments or property corner pins, the Borough cannot independently verify property lines on behalf of private property owners. Property owners are encouraged to engage a Professional Land Surveyor to prepare a site plan and physically set corner markers. This information is useful for locating potential property improvements such as fences and garages, laying out additions to the primary structure, and to satisfy property line disputes, if necessary. Plans for newer homes may be available at the Borough office. File a Right-to-Know Request, and the Borough staff will search the archives.



How do I register a new rental property? Borough Ordinance Chapter 11, Part 2 governs Residential Rental License Permits. Visit the Borough website and download the Rental Packet for New Rentals from the "Forms" list under the Permits & Licenses section.

Property Maintenance & Safety

As a property owner, you are responsible for mowing, trimming and spraying, as necessary to keep your property, as well as the public street frontage, clean and safe. The illustration below highlights some of the requirements for private maintenance of public rightsof-way.

REAR HOUSE NUMBER ORDINANCE

Residential rental properties in the Borough of Conshohocken are now required to have house numbers installed and maintained on the front and rear of dwelling structures used for residential rental unit(s). The ordinance requires separate identification of each unit for structures with separate entrances for multiple units, and requires placement of the applicable house number on structures blocking visibility of the rear entrance, where applicable. The house numbers required by the ordinance must be installed before a residential rental license may be issued or renewed.

ENGINEERING

Per the requirements of the Clean Water Act and Pennsylvania Clean Streams Law, the Borough is required to enforce a Stormwater Management Program, which is designed to reduce the discharge of pollutants from the public storm sewer system in order to protect water quality. The public storm sewer system includes storm sewer inlets, piping, swales, catch basins, channels, and even roads. Pollutants include soil, garbage, sewage, and nutrients found in fertilizers.

As part of this Program, the Borough submits periodic reports to the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection detailing how it complies with

the following Minimum Control Measure categories: Public Education and Outreach on Stormwater Impacts; Public Involvement/Participation; Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination; Construction Site Stormwater Runoff Control; Construction Stormwater Management; and Pollution Prevention/Good Housekeeping. The Borough also enforces a Pollution Reduction Plan to reduce the amount of sediment reaching the Plymouth Creek via the public storm sewer system.

How can you help?

The most important thing to keep in mind is that the public storm sewer system does not get treated - anything that enters the Borough's system eventually reaches the Plymouth Creek or Schuylkill River. This includes litter, pet waste, leaking oil, lawn fertilizer, pesticides, and car cleaning soaps. When taking care of your lawn, consider mulching lawn clippings to provide natural fertilizer and reducing the use of commercial fertilizer

and pesticide use or toxicity. Use only as much water as you need when watering your lawn and outdoor plants since water that runs off sidewalks and roadways carries pollutants into the public storm sewer system.

If you notice water flowing in the public storm sewer system during times of dry weather, this is a potential sign that there could be a problem. Please report any concerns to Conshohocken Borough at 610-828-1092.

ZONING SERVICES

What Residents Should Know About Zoning Permits

There are certain types of property improvements, which do not require a Building Permit, but do require a Zoning Permit. The Zoning Ordinance regulates the installation of residential fences; retaining walls; the installation of sheds, and the installation of parking pads, patios, driveways, and sidewalks within residential lots. Some of the requirements to be aware of are as follows.

Residential fences may not exceed 6 feet in height; must be set back 2 feet from an alley; and may not be located between the front wall of a dwelling and the street it faces.

Residential storage sheds may be located in the rear yard of properties. The shed must be set back 3 feet from property lines unless there is an alley, in which case it must be set back 5 feet from the alley. A shed must be 10 feet from the residence. Sheds not greater than 125 square feet are not considered in the permitted built area or impervious coverage on a lot. If



a shed is larger than 125 square feet, it may not increase the area of buildings on the lot beyond 35% of the lot's area; or 60% of the impervious coverage (areas that water cannot go through including buildings, sidewalks, parking pads, etc.) on a lot.

Patios, parking pads, and sidewalks other than the public sidewalk may not cause the impervious coverage on the lot to exceed 60%. Should the owner of a property choose to use porous pavers or other porous material; only half of the area to be covered will be counted as impervious.

The application for a Zoning Permit can be found on the Borough's web site, www.conshohockenpa.gov. A site plan showing the location of a fence, or the location and measurements of buildings and other impervious areas must be submitted with the Permit application. The permit fee is a flat fee of \$50.00; and permits require one to two weeks to process. For other questions regarding *Zoning Permits, contact the Borough Zoning Officer at 610-828-1092*.

HOUSING REHABILITATION PROGRAM



The Conshohocken Housing Rehabilitation Program is seeking General Contractors to work with the Program. Housing Rehabilitation has been in operation for well over 30 years and has brought over 200 properties. Property rehabilitation is designed to bring the homes of single-family, low-moderate income households into compliance with the building code and State established housing quality standards.

Construction activities include roof and window replacement, electrical upgrades, plumbing and kitchen improvements, accessibility improvements, heater replacement, exterior concrete work, etc. All properties are tested for lead based paint and radon. Remediation measures for unacceptable levels of lead paint and/or radon are included in technical specifications for the property to be rehabilitated. While not required; contractors are encouraged to be trained in lead paint safe work practices, or to be certified as a lead paint abatement contractor.

The Program completes between 5 and 8 projects per year. Payment is made based on satisfactorily completion of technical specification developed for each individual property. Funding for housing rehabilitation is provided by HUD through the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development. Conshohocken is an equal opportunity employer. Minority and women businesses are encouraged to apply as are Section 3 businesses.

Home & Fire Safety

Electric and Appliances

- Overloading outlets, circuits and extension cords can cause an electrical fire. Never use multiple extension cords in one outlet.
- Check the condition of all electrical cords. Make sure none are broken or cut.
- Check your plug outlets. Call an electrician if outlets are warm to the touch.
- Clean the lint from your dryer after each use.

Smoke Alarms

- Put smoke alarms on every level of the home.
- Put smoke alarms inside and outside sleeping areas.
- Test smoke alarms each month.
- Change smoke alarm batteries as needed.
- Make sure smoke alarms are less than 10 years old.

Carbon Monoxide Alarms

- Put carbon monoxide alarms on each level of the home.
- Make sure carbon monoxide alarms are less than 7 years old.

Fireworks Safety

Residents are reminded to use caution when interacting with fireworks. Fireworks, and/or sparklers can cause fires, burns, dismemberment or death if handled improperly. Pennsylvania residents are permitted to purchase and use consumer grade fireworks that contain a maximum of 50 milligrams of explosive material. Furthermore, the use and discharge of all display fireworks, including sparklers, is prohibited on all Borough property and parks.

2021 Holiday Solid Waste & Recycle Collection Schedule

Trash & Recycling Cart Updates

Borough approved containers must be used for all residential trash and recycling unless other arrangements have been made, and approved, by the Public Services Department. Trash and recycling carts must have 2 wheels, a metal life bar and attached lid. Unapproved containers will be tagged for no future pickups until the residence comes into compliance.

Trash Collection Rules and Regulations

- There is a limit of four (4) cans/bags per household per pick-up (200 pounds maximum)
- Each can/bag is not to be heavier than 50 pounds.
- Needles, syringes, lances and other sharp objects should be placed in a metal container with a secure lid so as not to be a hazard.
- Please place your cans/bags at curbside on your property no earlier than 5:00 PM the night before. Cans must be removed from curbside no later than 7:00 PM the day of collection.
- No clean-outs or move-outs unless prearranged 24 hours in advance. Please call (610) 828-1092.
- No construction debris or carpet unless prearranged 24 hours in advance. Please call (610) 828-1092.
- Trash will be left curbside and 'red tagged' if deemed to be too heavy, improperly placed, or in an unapproved container. Trash that is left should be returned to the property before 7:00 PM.

Conshohocken Is Single Stream Recycling

Single stream recycling allows all of your recyclable materials to be placed into one recycling container. Residents will see trash trucks collecting recyclables. Recycling carts should be left out before 7:00 AM on collection day, at the front edge of your property or designated collection point.

Yard Waste Collection Rules and Regulations

Yard waste stickers are available at the Borough office to convert your old blue recycle bin into a container for yard waste disposal.

All residences must participate in the Borough's recycling programs by separating their recyclable material from their regular trash. Yard waste is recyclable, therefore the separation and collection of this material is mandated by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and Conshohocken Borough.

- Weeds, leaves, brush and plants should be placed in biodegradable paper composting bags. Please no trash in these bags.
- Each bag should not to be heavier than 50 pounds.
- Tree branches under five (5") in diameter, not exceeding five (5') in length, are to be securely tied into bundles and should not to be heaver then 50 pounds.
- Christmas trees. No decorations, tree stands or plastic tree bags.
- Please place your bags, and/or bundles at curbside on your property no earlier than 5:00 PM the night before.

GRASS CLIPPINGS ARE NO LONGER ACCEPTED WITH YARD WASTE COLLECTION

There are several options for recycling your grass clippings, here are a few ideas:

- Leave on your lawn to act as a natural fertilizer.
- Use them to fill raised vegetable gardens or flower beds.
- Spread them as mulch around the base of trees, shrubs, or potting soil.
- add them to your compost pile as a source of "green" high nitrogen material.

Frequently Asked Questions

Do I need a permit for...? Any work beyond a basic repair or a non-structural alteration may require a building permit issued by the Borough's Building Code Official for both residential and commercial properties. The best course of action is to contact the Borough at (610) 828-1092, and ask a building inspector if a permit is required for your project. Be prepared to provide a detailed scope of work for the project,

and identify the property as residential or commercial. Change in use may require zoning approval.

Am I responsible for maintaining the alley behind my house? Yes. Typically, the property owners on each side of an alley are responsible to maintain to the center of the alley for the width of each respective property. This includes the alley pavement surface (e.g. potholes), as well as grass, weeds, trash, etc., that may be found in an alley, regardless of how it ended up there. Weeds on the other side of your fence along the alley are still part of your property, and therefore your responsibility to trim and/or spray. The Borough does not plow snow in alleys.

Why does the Borough need to inspect the home I'm selling?

Borough Ordinance Chapter 11, Part 1 governs Transfer of Real Estate and Real Estate Certification. Per §11-111, anyone selling a property in the Borough is responsible to certify that there are no uncorrected violations of any housing, building, zoning, safety or fire codes. The Borough performs an inspection based on a Real Estate Certification Checklist, which was adopted by Borough Council and records any apparent violations. It is required that all violations be corrected prior to settlement, or the responsibility to correct said violations may be transferred to the buyer, who will have 12 months to complete the work. The terms of such a transfer are private and fall outside of the Borough's authority.

Where exactly is my property line? Absent physically apparent monuments or property corner pins, the Borough cannot independently verify property lines on behalf of private property owners. Property owners are encouraged to engage a Professional Land Surveyor to prepare a site plan and physically set corner markers. This information is useful for locating potential property improvements such as fences and garages, laying out additions to the primary structure, and to satisfy property line disputes, if necessary. Plans for newer homes may be available at the Borough office. File a Right-to-Know Request, and the Borough staff will search the archives.

How do I register a new rental property?

Borough Ordinance Chapter 11, Part 2 governs Residential Rental License Permits. Visit the Borough website and download the Rental Packet for New Rentals from the "Forms" list under the Permits & Licenses section.



Property Maintenance & Safety

As a property owner, you are responsible for mowing, trimming and spraying, as necessary to keep your property, as well as the public street frontage, clean and safe.

REAR HOUSE NUMBER ORDINANCE

Residential rental properties in the Borough of Conshohocken are now required to have house numbers installed and maintained on the front and rear of dwelling structures used for residential rental unit(s). The ordinance requires separate identification of each unit for structures with separate entrances for multiple units, and requires placement of the applicable house number on structures blocking visibility of the rear entrance, where applicable. The house numbers required by the ordinance must be installed before a residential rental license may be issued or renewed.

ENVIRONMENTAL ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Conshohocken Environmental Advisory Council (EAC) is dedicated to improving the environment in our community, through volunteer events, education and advising Borough Council on environmentally friendly changes. The EAC hosts many environmentally focused events each year where the public is invited to participate, learn and have some fun.

Included in these events are two community cleanups, which usually take hundreds of pounds of trash off our streets each time! Our members, in conjunction with the Borough Public Services Department, also hosts two tree plantings each year. Friends and families can get their hands dirty all



while learning proper planting technique! We've planted dozens of trees in Sutcliffe Park and the "B" Field in just the last two years. This is in addition to numerous environmental workshops held throughout the year for children and adults alike. Recent topics have included the Spotted Lanternfly, stormwater management, solar energy and others.

PUBLIC MEETING held via GoToMeeting video/teleconference

CALL TO ORDER

The Public Meeting of the Conshohocken Borough Council duly advertised, was held remotely using the GoToMeeting platform. Colleen Leonard, Council President, called the meeting to order at 7:05 PM.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT ANNOUNCEMENTS

Ms. Leonard thanked everyone for attending the virtual Council meeting. She reviewed the meeting logistics and participation instructions. She announced that Council held Executive Session prior to the regularly scheduled meeting on legal matters.

COUNCIL BUSINESS

a.) Conduct an interview for the Vacancy Board

Ms. Leonard introduced Holly Holst who was present to interview for the Vacancy Board. Ms. Holst shared that she currently serves on the Friends of Conshohocken Parks and the Conshohocken Elementary PTO and is an active member of St. Marks Lutheran Church. She discussed the importance of the Vacancy Board as it ensures that Borough business can continue without delay in the event of a vacancy on Borough Council. Ms. Holst acknowledged that the position is non-partisan and discussed her approach at decision-making.

LAND USE MATTERS, PUBLIC HEARINGS AND ORDINANCES

a.) Consider granting conditional use approval for 261-263 East Elm Street

Mr. Peters opened the public hearing for the continued hearing for the conditional use application for 261-263 Elm Street. Mr. Peters stated that the applicant is seeking approval to permit a modern multifamily housing development in the Limited Industrial Zoning District pursuant to the provisions of the Residential Overlay District and to permit a building height greater than 35 feet. He reminded Council that the relief for building height is being requested to accommodate scissors lifts underneath the building to provide additional parking. He reviewed the proposed conditions of approval.

Ms. Leonard made a motion to grant conditional use for 261-263 East Elm Street pursuant to Zoning Ordinance 27-1902-B and 27-1903-B.11 to permit a modern multifamily housing development as presented by Borough Council with a height of 45 feet (on the Elm Street façade) subject to nine (9) conditions of approval, seconded by Ms. Sokolowski. The motion carried 7-0.

b.) Discussion on adopting a nuisance ordinance relative to animal control

Ms. Cecco shared that Administration has received complaints regarding feral cats in the Borough. She explained that residents have health and safety concerns regarding neighbors feeding stray cats and have requested that Borough Council consider an ordinance that would regulate feral cats. Ms. Cecco reviewed similar ordinances in place in neighboring municipalities. She discussed the concept of hiring an animal control officer and allowing residents to commence civil action to enforce the provisions of the ordinance.

Members of Borough Council and Mayor Aronson discussed feedback that they have received from residents on the topic. Mayor Aronson reported that residents are personally hiring animal control professionals to address the issue. Ms. Flanagan stated that controlling the situation should not be a burden on the residents. Ms. Sokolowski acknowledged that establishing rules and regulations relative to animal control is necessary to protect the health, safety and welfare of the residents. Ms. Barton asked that Administration look into regulations that would prohibit animals from running at large. Mayor Aronson requested including provisions related to the keeping of roosters in the ordinance. Ms. Leonard stressed the importance creating provisions for effective enforcement.

Council authorized Administration to continue working on amending the Borough Ordinance to establish additional rules and regulations relative to animal control.

PRESENTATIONS

a.) MS4 Presentation, Karen MacNair, Borough Engineer

Karen MacNair, Borough Engineer, was present to provide an update on the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4). Ms. MacNair stated that the MS4 permit authorizes the Borough to discharge stormwater to the Plymouth Creek and Schuylkill River. She discussed the permit requirements, which include the reduction of discharge of pollutants and the removal of hazardous connections. She reviewed the six (6) Minimum Control Measures that the Borough must implement in order to meet the requirements of the permit.

Ms. MacNair explained that the Borough is also required to implement a Pollutant Reduction Plan to reduce sediment carried in stormwater within the Plymouth Creek watershed by ten percent. She confirmed that the Borough's Pollutant Reduction Plan, to construct an underground basin at Sutcliffe Park, has been approved by PennDOT.

MANAGER MATTERS

a.) Consider approving Resolution 2021-10 approving an extension of temporary parking regulations within the Borough

Ms. Cecco explained that Borough established temporary "No Parking" areas on the East side of Fayette Street between East First Avenue and East Second Avenue to support our restaurants with takeout and outdoor dining options during the pandemic. With those temporary no parking regulations set to expire, Ms. Cecco requested that Council consider approving an extension of the no parking regulations for a period of 90 days. She shared that the Parking Task Force would evaluate the temporary regulations and make a recommendation to Council for future regulations.

Ms. Barton made a motion to approve Resolution 2021-10 extending temporary parking regulations within the Borough, seconded by Mr. Stokley. The motion carried 7-0.

b.) Consider approving the second and final security escrow release for 130 West Fifth Avenue in the amount of \$17,615.70

Ms. Cecco shared that the Borough Engineer completed a final site inspection and prepared an escrow release recommendation for approval by Borough Council. Ms. Cecco stated that the release is contingent upon receipt of the 18-month maintenance bond.

Mr. Griffin made a motion to approve the second and final security escrow release for 130 West Fifth Avenue in the amount of \$17,615.70, seconded by Ms. Barton. The motion carried 7-0.

c.) Consider accepting the resignation of a Dog Park Advisory Committee member

Ms. Cecco stated that the Borough received the resignation of Georgina Weber from the Dog Park Advisory Committee.

Ms. Tutino made a motion to accept the resignation of Georgina Weber from the Dog Park Advisory Committee, seconded by Ms. Flanagan. The motion carried 7-0.

d.) Consider approving SORA West Parking Garage signage that extends into the Right-of-Way

Ms. Cecco shared that the SORA West project submitted a building permit application for ground level parking garage signage. She explained that some of the proposed signs were located within the ultimate right-of-way of the abutting streets, which is not permitted unless approved by Borough Council.

Ms. Flanagan made a motion to approve SORA West Parking Garage signage that extends into the Rightof-Way, seconded by Ms. Barton. Mr. Stokley recused himself. The motion carried 6-0.

e.) Discussion on Hometown Heroes Banner Program

Ms. Cecco shared that Administration received a request from the Hometown Heroes Banner Program and VFW Post 1074 to bring the banner program to Conshohocken on Fayette Street. She stated that the banner program is a living tribute to recognize and honor veterans who are serving or who have served in the armed forces. She explained that the Hometown Heroes organization, in conjunction with the VFW, would handle the administrative duties and the production and delivery of the banners and that the Borough would be responsible for hanging and storing the banners. She reviewed costs associated with program, which included specialized brackets for the banners and fees for a bucket truck to install and remove the banners. Ms. Cecco identified a scheduling conflict with hanging the banners on Fayette Street.

Walt Harnett of the VFW asked Council to consider launching a pilot program for 2021 to be limited to outside of the VFW. Borough Council supported the idea of a pilot program for 2021 and asked Ms. Cecco work with the Hometown Heroes and the VFW on a 2022/2023 cycle to be highlighted at different locations other than Fayette Street.

DEPARTMENT MATTERS

There were no department matters.

LEGAL MATTERS

There were no legal matters.

COUNCIL MEMBER AND MAYOR MATTERS

Mayor Aronson recognized the success of the Flag Planting event at Calvary cemetery and the VFW Memorial Day Services. He reminded everyone that the Arts Festival and Car Show is on June 5, 2021.

Mr. Stokley shared that an auction is scheduled for a property on Maple Street, which includes a vacant parcel that runs to the edge of Sutcliffe Park. He asked if the Borough would consider purchasing the property for open space. Ms. Cecco responded that Administration has a meeting scheduled with the property owner and will follow-up with Council.

Ms. Flanagan recognized Mayor Aronson and his Committee for all their hard work with the Arts Festival and Car Show.

Ms. Sokolowski shared that the Friends of Conshohocken Parks will have a gift basket raffle at the Arts Festival and Car Show to raise money for a zip line at Sutcliffe Park. Mr. Stokley offered to donate \$500.00 to the Friends of Conshohocken Parks for the zip line.

Ms. Leonard recognized Lauren Irizarry, Director of Recreation Services, for the success of the Senior Barbeque.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Brittany Rogers, Executive Assistant to the Borough Manager, stated that four (4) individuals submitted written public comment. Ms. Rogers read the comments.

Erik Stalford, 350 West Elm Street, stated that he is in full support of an ordinance to control the stray cat problem in Conshohocken. He reported seeing 10-15 cats around Haines and Salvati Park being fed by a neighbor.

Sam Nagle, 350 West Elm Street, stated that he observed a neighbor feeding approximately 15-20 cats at Haines and Salvati Park. He asked Council for their support to regulate the feeding of stray cats.

Katie Kirlin, 331 Spring Mill Avenue, discussed the potential health related issues associated with feral cats. She asked Council for their support to regulate the feeding of stray cats.

Dennis Hannan, 448 West 6th Avenue, reported a neighbor who throws food on the sidewalk when he is walking his dog.

Seth Piechowski, 335 Spring Mill Avenue, discussed how feeding stray cats contributes to the challenge of increased feral cat populations. He also discussed health related issues and property damage associated with feral cats.

Walt Hartnett with the VFW Post 1074 reported an incident with a neighbor related to music during events at the VFW. Ms. Cecco responded that the Police Department purchased a decibel meter and will be monitoring the VFW to ensure that the noise level is in compliance with the noise ordinance.

Scott Langstein, 200 West Elm Street, commented that the double left turn lane from Fayette Street on to West Elm Street merges into one (1) lane pretty quickly after the intersection.

Sean Purcell, 226 East 5th Avenue, acknowledged that rules and regulations relative to feral cats must be established in order to control the issue. He questioned why Borough Council continues to approve major residential developments that would only add to Conshohocken's traffic problems.

ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 8:22 PM.

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INTRODUCTION & PURPOSE

Polluted stormwater runoff has been identified by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as one of the main causes of the nation's water quality problems. To help alleviate this situation, the EPA requires communities with municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4s) to obtain a permit under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) program authorizing their stormwater discharges.

As a requirement of the NPDES MS4 General Permit, the Borough of Conshohocken must develop a written Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination Manual. This document will serve to establish procedures for reporting, screening, identifying, eliminating, and preventing illicit discharges to the Borough's municipal separate storm sewer system.

This Manual was prepared by utilizing the *Illicit Discharge Detection & Elimination Manual: A Guidance for Program Development & Technical Assistance*, prepared by the Center for Watershed Protection, dated October 2004 ("Guidance Manual"). DEFINITION & TYPES OF ILLICIT DISCHARGE

For the purpose of this Manual, "illicit discharge" is defined as a storm drain that has measurable flow during dry weather containing contaminants and/or pathogens. A storm drain that has flow during dry weather, but the flow does not contain contaminants and/or pathogens, is simply considered a discharge. Below is a list of common sources of dry weather flow:

- Sewage and septic flows.
- "Washwater" flows from residential laundry, commercial car washes, shop floor drains, etc.
- Liquid wastes such as oil, paint, and process water.
- Potable water entering the storm sewer.
- Landscape irrigation runoff from overwatering.
- Groundwater and spring flows.
- Firefighting activities.
- Air conditioning condensate.

All types of dry weather flow can be characterized into three types of flow:

- **Continuous** flows are present most or all of the time and are generally the easiest to detect.
- **Intermittent** flows occur over a short period of time, maybe a few hours a day or a few days out of the year. These flows are often harder to find due to their shortened flow time.
- **Transitory** flows are one-time flows caused by a spill or other event. Examples of transitory flows include: sewer breaks, storage tank leaks, traffic accidents, etc. These types of flows are rarely detected during routine monitoring, but have the potential to have severe impacts on the waterway.

Dry weather flows can either enter the storm sewer system directly or indirectly.

• **Direct** flows occur through a sewer pipe, shop drain, or other conveyance method and are many times the result of an improper plumbing connection. Older industrial and commercial areas often contain direct illicit connections to the storm sewer system.

• **Indirect** flow is generated outside of the storm sewer system and enters though drain inlets or groundwater infiltration. Examples of indirect flows include: groundwater seepage, spills, illegal dumping into storm drains, outdoor washing runoff, overuse of irrigation systems.

Note again that the presence of dry weather flow does not mean that an illicit discharge is present. Testing is required to determine whether a dry weather flow contains contaminants and/or pathogens.

Prohibited discharges and connections to the Borough's MS4, and related enforcement and penalties, are to be defined in Borough Ordinances.

IDENTIFIED PRIORITY AREAS

The Borough encompasses an area of approximately 1 square mile and drains to the Plymouth Creek and Schuylkill River. Current land uses within the Borough are primarily residential, commercial, and open space, with limited high-risk activities such as industrial land uses. Incorporated in 1850, the Borough did have industrial uses along the Schuylkill River but most of these areas have been or are being redeveloped for residential and commercial uses.

The Borough has 29 mapped outfalls, including 6 dry weather flows. Through annual testing, there has been no evidence of illicit discharges being associated with the dry weather flows; however, they will continue to be monitored. The Borough also televised the mapped public storm sewer system in 2018 and found no evidence of illicit connections.

Based on the historic uses and proximity to the rivers, the priority areas for the Borough would be the high illicit discharge potential within the lands of the former industrial uses along the Schuylkill River which have not yet been redeveloped. The Borough will continue to utilize any reported potential illicit discharges and the results of the outfall screening and related dry weather flow testing to identify future illicit discharges.

PROCEDURES FOR REPORTING OF ILLICIT DISCHARGES

Potential illicit discharges and stormwater pollution may be discovered and reported to the Borough through a variety of ways, including: routine outfall inspections, discovery by Borough staff during regular activities, reporting by emergency personnel, resident complaints, etc. No matter where the report originates, the flow chart on the next page is to be followed in order to guarantee that the discharge is investigated thoroughly.

The Borough Manager and the Borough's Executive Director of Operations are aware of the Borough's obligations related to the MS4 permit. All reports of illicit discharges made to the Borough will go to the Borough Manager and/or Executive Director of Operations. They will be responsible for assessing the specific situation and involving either Borough Public Services or the Borough Engineer as necessary. This Manual and will advise the Borough on the proper mode of investigation and removal in the event that an illicit discharge is discovered.

An Illicit Discharge Reporting Form, attached as Appendix A, shall be filled out as completely as possible each time an illicit discharge is discovered by and/or reported to the Borough. If the illicit discharge is reporting to the Borough, the Borough or its Borough Engineer will complete a follow up investigation to complete the form. Screening, identification, and elimination of the source shall be completed using the following sections of this Manual.

In the event that no illicit discharges are discovered within any given permit year, the Borough may choose to complete one Illicit Discharge Inspection Summary Report detailing no activity within that permit year.



OUTFALL SCREENING PROCEDURES

Per direction from the Borough, the Borough Engineer performs the required outfall screening in accordance with the Guidance Manual. The Borough Engineer screens each dry weather flow on an annual basis and all other outfalls a minimum of once per permit term. Dry weather flow sampling collection is completed when there has been 72 hours without rainfall, snow, or observable snow melt. It is not anticipated that sampling will need to be adjusted to account of groundwater influence. Obtaining an outfall screening in response to a report of stormwater pollution will be completed as soon as possible.

The Borough Engineer purchases monitoring equipment for collection of samples, collects samples, and submits any collected samples to a private lab for analysis, following the procedures in Appendix G of the Guidance Manual.

Inspection reports for each screened outfall will be completed by the Borough Engineer, using the most recent version of the DEP's MS4 Outfall Screening Report, and will be submitted to the DEP with the required progress reports. A copy of this Report is attached as Appendix B.

IDENTIFYING THE SOURCE OF AN ILLICIT DISCHARGE

Once a contaminated flow is detected, the next step is to trace it back to the source of the illicit discharge.

Using the information collected on the Illicit Discharge Reporting Form and/or MS4 Outfall Field Screening Report, via photographs, and laboratory testing results from any collected samples, the Borough will look for identifying factors to help identify the potential source. For example, the table included on the next page was taken from the Guidance Manual and outlines potential types of illicit discharges based on land use.

The Borough will then determine whether a drainage area investigation, trunk investigation, and/or on-site discharge investigation will be the next step in identifying the source. One, all or a combination of these methods may necessary to identify the source of a single illicit discharge.

A drainage area investigation would be used first where the drainage area to the outfall is large or complex and the flow type in the discharge appears to be specific to a certain type of land use or generating site. A trunk investigation would be appropriate to search the source of the illicit discharge from the storm sewer system. This could be completed by televising the storm sewer line, visual inspection at manholes or inlets to determine where the dry weather flow begins, or non-toxic dye testing in search of the illicit discharge source. On-site investigation could be completed by non-toxic dye testing the plumbing system from inside a building. Communication with other local agencies, such as when and where the testing is to take place, is to be considered prior to any non-toxic dye testing to avoid concern regarding a spill or pollution episode.

If the Borough believes the source of the illicit discharge is caused by the interaction of the sanitary sewer system, the same investigation methods as identified above would be sufficient. However, if it is believed that on-lot sanitary systems are interacting with the storm sewer system, a surface condition analysis should be conducted. This analysis would including analyzing for obvious indicators such as foul odors; wet, spongy ground; particularly lush plant growth or burnt grass; algal blooms; cave-ins or exposes system components; and system bypasses.

The Borough and Borough Solicitor will evaluate on a case-by-case basis the best mechanism for gaining access to private property to inspect illicit discharge, such as verbal or signed consent from the property owner.

Once the source of an illicit discharge has been identified, steps should be taken to fix or eliminate the discharge.

ELIMINATING AN ILLICIT DISCHARGE

In order to eliminate an illicit discharge, the Borough will need to determine who is responsible for the elimination, the method of removal, and how the removal will be confirmed. In the event the Borough determines that an unpermitted discharge significantly contributes pollutants the MS4, the Borough will notify the responsible person to cease the discharge.
The Borough can utilize the following flow chart to move through these steps. A Notice of Violation would be issued by Borough staff. If desired, the Borough may elect to utilize the Borough Solicitor's office to notify a land owner of the illicit discharge coming from their property and request access to the subject property to further investigate the situation prior to taking further action.



Flow Chart for Corrective Action

The Borough and Borough Solicitor will evaluate on a case-by-case basis the best mechanism for gaining access to private property to eliminate illicit discharges where the owner refuses compliance. Prohibited discharges and connections to the Borough's MS4, and related enforcement and penalties, are to be defined in Borough Ordinances.

The Borough will also provide educational outreach to its employees and the general public about what is considered an illicit discharge and steps that can be taken to eliminate them in hopes of preventing future illicit discharges before they occur.

PROGRAM EVALUATION & ASSESSMENT

This Manual is intended to be a dynamic document that will be reviewed each year by the Borough MS4 Coordinator and other pertinent Borough staff to determine whether a revision to the document is needed. Any comments received, including those from Borough staff, Borough

Engineer, DEP, residents, etc., will be evaluated and incorporated in a revised Manual as the Borough deems necessary.

What is stormwater runoff?

Why is stormwater runof



Stormwater runoff occurs when precipitation from rain or snowmelt flows over the ground. Impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks, and streets prevent stormwater from naturally soaking into the ground.

The effects of pollution

Polluted stormwater runoff can have many adverse effects on plants, fish, animals, and people.

- Sediment can cloud the water and make it difficult or impossible for aquatic plants to grow. Sediment also can destroy aquatic habitats.
- Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die, they sink to the bottom and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organisms can't exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels.

Stormwater can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland, or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

- Bacteria and other pathogens can wash into swimming areas and create health hazards, often making beach closures necessary.
- Debris—plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles, and cigarette butts—washed into waterbodies can choke, suffocate, or disable aquatic life like ducks, fish, turtles, and birds.
- Household hazardous wastes like insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil, and other auto fluids can poison aquatic life. Land animals and people can become sick or die from eating diseased fish and shellfish or ingesting polluted water.



 Polluted stormwater often affects drinking water sources. This, in turn, can affect human health and increase drinking water treatment costs.

Stormwater Pollution Solutions

Recycle or properly dispose of household products that contain chemicals, such as insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, and used motor oil and other auto fluids. Don't pour them onto the ground or into storm drains.

Lawn care

Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. In addition, yard clippings and leaves can wash



into storm drains and contribute nutrients and organic matter to streams.

- Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler.
- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams.
- Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used in landscaping projects.

Auto care

Washing your car and degreasing auto parts at home can send detergents and other contaminants through the storm sewer system. Dumping automotive fluids into storm drains has the same result as dumping the materials directly into a waterbody.

- Use a commercial car wash that treats or recycles its wastewater, or wash your car on your yard so the water infiltrates into the ground.
- Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.







Education is essential to changing people's behavior. Signs and markers near storm drains warn residents that pollutants entering the drains will be carried untreated into a local waterbody.

Residential landscaping

Permeable Pavement—Traditional concrete and asphalt don't allow water to soak into the ground. Instead these surfaces rely on storm drains to divert unwanted water. Permeable pavement systems allow rain and snowmelt to soak through, decreasing stormwater runoff.

Rain Barrels—You can collect rainwater from rooftops in mosquitoproof containers. The water can be used later on lawn or garden areas.



Rain Gardens and Grassy Swales—Specially designed areas planted



rainwater to collect and soak into the ground. Rain from rooftop areas or paved areas can be diverted into these areas rather than into storm drains.

Vegetated Filter Strips—Filter strips are areas of native grass or plants created along roadways or streams. They trap the pollutants stormwater picks up as it flows across driveways and streets.



Dirt, oil, and debris that collect in parking lots and paved areas can be washed into the storm sewer system and eventually enter local waterbodies.

- Sweep up litter and debris from sidewalks, driveways and parking lots, especially around storm drains.
- Cover grease storage and dumpsters and keep them clean to avoid leaks.
- Report any chemical spill to the local hazardous waste cleanup team. They'll know the best way to keep spills from harming the environment.

Erosion controls that aren't maintained can cause excessive amounts of sediment and debris to be carried into the stormwater system. Construction vehicles can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater and deposited into local waterbodies.

- Divert stormwater away from disturbed or exposed areas of the construction site.
- Install silt fences, vehicle mud removal areas, vegetative cover, and other sediment and erosion controls and properly maintain them, especially after rainstorms.
- Prevent soil erosion by minimizing disturbed areas during construction projects, and seed and mulch bare areas as soon as possible.





Lack of vegetation on streambanks can lead to erosion. Overgrazed pastures can also contribute excessive amounts of sediment to local waterbodies. Excess fertilizers and pesticides can poison aquatic animals and lead to destructive algae blooms. Livestock in streams can contaminate waterways with bacteria, making them unsafe for human contact. Automotive acilities



maintained septic systems release nutrients and pathogens (bacteria and viruses) that can be picked up by stormwater and discharged into nearby waterbodies. Pathogens can cause public health problems and environmental concerns.

- Inspect your system every 3 years and pump your tank as necessary (every 3 to 5 years).
- Don't dispose of household hazardous waste in sinks or toilets.

Pet waste can be a major source of bacteria and

 When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local



- Keep livestock away from streambanks and provide them a water source away from waterbodies.
- Store and apply manure away from waterbodies and in accordance with a nutrient management plan.
- Vegetate riparian areas along waterways.
- Rotate animal grazing to prevent soil erosion in fields.
- Apply fertilizers and pesticides according to label instructions to save money and minimize pollution.

Improperly managed logging operations can result in erosion and sedimentation.

- Conduct preharvest planning to prevent erosion and lower costs.
- Use logging methods and equipment that minimize soil disturbance.
- Plan and design skid trails, yard areas, and truck access roads to minimize stream crossings and avoid disturbing the forest floor.
- Construct stream crossings so that they minimize erosion and physical changes to streams.
- Expedite revegetation of cleared areas.



Uncovered fueling stations allow spills to be washed into storm drains. Cars waiting to be repaired can leak fuel, oil, and other harmful fluids that can be picked up by stormwater.

- Clean up spills immediately and properly dispose of cleanup materials.
- Provide cover over fueling stations and design or retrofit facilities for spill containment.
- Properly maintain fleet vehicles to prevent oil, gas, and other discharges from being washed into local waterbodies.
- Install and maintain oil/water separators.

Stormwater runoff is precipitation from rain or snowmelt that flows over the ground. As it flows, it can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and deposit them into a storm sewer system or waterbody.

Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged *untreated* into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

Remember: Only Rain Down the Drain

To keep the stormwater leaving your home or workplace clean, follow these simple guidelines:

- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly.
- Repair auto leaks.
- Dispose of household



hazardous waste, used auto fluids (antifreeze, oil, etc.), and batteries at designated collection or recycling locations.

- Clean up after your pet.
- Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface.
- Sweep up yard debris rather than hosing down areas. Compost or recycle yard waste when possible.
- Clean paint brushes in a sink, not outdoors. Properly dispose of excess paints through a household hazardous waste collection program.
- Sweep up and properly dispose of construction debris like concrete and mortar.

A s stormwater flows over driveways, lawns, and sidewalks, it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. Stormwater can flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland, or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water.

By practicing healthy household habits, homeowners can keep common pollutants like pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings, and automotive fluids off the ground and out of stormwater. Adopt these healthy household habits and help protect lakes, streams, rivers, wetlands, and coastal waters. Remember to share the habits with your neighbors!

Healthy Household Habits for Clean Water

Vehicle and Garage

• Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a lawn or other unpaved surface to **minimize** the amount of dirty, soapy water flowing into the storm drain and eventually into your local waterbody.



- Check your car, boat, motorcycle, and other machinery and equipment for leaks and spills. Make repairs as soon as possible. Clean up **spilled fluids** with an absorbent material like kitty litter or sand, and don't rinse the spills into a nearby storm drain. Remember to properly dispose of the absorbent material.
 - **Recycle** used oil and other automotive fluids at participating service stations. Don't dump these chemicals down the storm drain or dispose of them in your trash.

Lawn and Garden

- Use pesticides and fertilizers **sparingly**. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Avoid application if the forecast calls for rain; otherwise, chemicals will be washed into your local stream.
- Select **native** plants and grasses that are drought- and pestresistant. Native plants require less water, fertilizer, and pesticides.
- Sweep up yard debris, rather than hosing down areas. Compost or recycle yard waste when possible.
- Don't overwater your lawn. Water during the **cool** times of the day, and don't let water run off into the storm drain.
- Cover piles of dirt and mulch being used in landscaping projects to prevent these pollutants from blowing or washing off your yard and into local waterbodies. **Vegetate** bare spots in your yard to prevent soil erosion.

nome Repair and improvement

- Before beginning an outdoor project, locate the nearest storm drains and **protect** them from debris and other materials.
- Sweep up and properly dispose of construction debris such as concrete and mortar.
- Use hazardous substances like paints, solvents, and cleaners in the **smallest amounts possible**, and follow the directions on the label. Clean up spills **immediately**, and dispose of the waste safely. Store substances properly to avoid leaks and spills.
- Purchase and use **nontoxic**, **biodegradable**, **recycled**, and **recyclable** products whenever possible.
- Clean paint brushes in a sink, not outdoors. Filter and reuse paint thinner when using oil-based paints. Properly dispose of excess paints through a household hazardous waste collection program, or donate unused paint to local organizations.
- **Reduce** the amount of paved area and increase the amount of vegetated area in your yard. Use native plants in your landscaping to reduce the need for watering during dry periods. Consider directing downspouts away from paved surfaces onto lawns and other measures to increase infiltration and reduce polluted runoff.

destroy the biological treatment taking place in the system. Other items, such as diapers, paper towels, and cat litter, can clog the septic system and potentially damage components.



Pet Care

 When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local waterbodies.

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- Drain your swimming pool only when a test kit does not detect chlorine levels.
- Whenever possible, drain your pool or spa into the sanitary sewer system.
- Properly store pool and spa chemicals to **prevent** leaks and spills, preferably in a covered area to avoid exposure to stormwater.

Septic System Use and Maintenance

- Have your septic system **inspected** by a professional at least every 3 years, and have the septic tank **pumped** as necessary (usually every 3 to 5 years).
- Care for the septic system drainfield by **not** driving or parking vehicles on it. Plant only grass over and near the drainfield to avoid damage from roots.
- Flush responsibly. Flushing household chemicals like paint, pesticides, oil, and antifreeze can



Protecting Water Quality from URBAN RUNOFF

Clean Water 15 Everybody's Business

n urban and suburban areas, much of the land surface is covered by buildings and pavement, which do not allow rain and snowmelt to soak into the ground. Instead, most developed areas rely on storm drains to carry large amounts of runoff from roofs and paved areas to nearby waterways. The stormwater runoff carries pollutants such as oil, dirt, chemicals, and lawn fertilizers directly to streams and rivers, where they seriously harm water quality. To protect surface water quality and groundwater resources, development should be designed and built to minimize increases in runoff.

How Urbanized Areas Affect Water Quality Increased Runoff

The porous and varied terrain of natural landscapes like forests, wetlands, and grasslands traps rainwater and snowmelt and allows them to filter slowly into the ground. In contrast, impervious (nonporous) surfaces like roads, parking lots, and rooftops prevent rain and snowmelt from infiltrating, or soaking, into the ground. Most of the rainfall The most recent National Water Quality Inventory reports that runoff from urbanized areas is the leading source of water quality impairments to surveyed estuaries and the third-largest source of impairments to surveyed lakes.

Did you know that because of impervious surfaces like pavement and rooftops, a typical city block generates more than 5 times more runoff than a woodland area of the same size?

and snowmelt remains above the surface, where it runs off rapidly in unnaturally large amounts.

Storm sewer systems concentrate runoff into smooth, straight conduits. This runoff gathers speed and erosional power as it travels underground. When this runoff leaves the storm drains and empties into a stream, its excessive volume and power blast out streambanks, damaging streamside vegetation and wiping out aquatic habitat. These increased storm flows carry sediment loads from construction sites and other denuded surfaces and eroded streambanks. They often carry higher water temperatures from streets, roof tops, and parking lots, which are harmful to the health and reproduction of aquatic life.



Relationship between impervious cover and surface runoff. Impervious cover in a watershed results in increased surface runnoff. As little as 10 percent impervious cover in a watershed can result in stream degradation.

The loss of infiltration from urbanization may also cause profound groundwater changes. Although urbanization leads to great increases in flooding during and immediately after wet weather, in many instances it results in lower stream flows during dry weather. Many native fish and other aquatic life cannot survive when these conditions prevail.

Increased Pollutant Loads

Urbanization increases the variety and amount of pollutants carried into streams, rivers, and lakes. The pollutants include:

- Sediment
- Oil, grease, and toxic chemicals from motor vehicles
- Pesticides and nutrients from lawns and gardens
- Viruses, bacteria, and nutrients from pet waste and failing septic systems
- Road salts
- Heavy metals from roof shingles, motor vehicles, and other sources
- Thermal pollution from dark impervious surfaces such as streets and rooftops

These pollutants can harm fish and wildlife populations, kill native vegetation, foul drinking water supplies, and make recreational areas unsafe and unpleasant.

Managing Urban Runoff What Homeowners Can Do

To decrease polluted runoff from paved surfaces, households can develop alternatives to areas traditionally covered by impervious surfaces. Porous pavement materials are available for driveways and sidewalks, and native vegetation and mulch can replace high maintenance grass lawns. Homeowners can use fertilizers sparingly and sweep driveways, sidewalks, and roads instead of using a hose. Instead of disposing of yard waste, they can use the materials to start a compost pile. And homeowners can learn to use Integrated Pest Management (IPM) to reduce dependence on harmful pesticides.

In addition, households can prevent polluted runoff by picking up after pets and using, storing, and disposing of chemicals properly. Drivers should check their cars for leaks and recycle their motor oil and antifreeze when these fluids are changed. Drivers can also avoid impacts from car wash runoff (e.g., detergents, grime, etc.) by using car wash facilities that do not generate runoff. Households served by septic systems should have them professionally inspected and pumped every 3 to 5 years. They should also practice water conservation measures to extend the life of their septic systems.

Controlling Impacts from New Development

Developers and city planners should attempt to control the volume of runoff from new development by using low impact development, structural controls, and pollution prevention strategies. Low impact development includes measures that conserve natural areas (particularly sensitive hydrologic areas like riparian buffers and infiltrable soils); reduce development impacts; and reduce site runoff rates by maximizing surface roughness, infiltration opportunities, and flow paths.

Controlling Impacts from Existing Development

Controlling runoff from existing urban areas is often more costly than controlling runoff from new developments. Economic efficiencies are often realized through approaches that target "hot spots" of runoff pollution or have multiple benefits, such as high-efficiency street sweeping (which addresses aesthetics, road safety, and water quality). Urban planners and others responsible for managing urban and suburban areas can first identify and implement pollution prevention strategies and examine source control opportunities. They should seek out priority pollutant reduction opportunities, then protect natural areas that help control runoff, and finally begin ecological restoration and retrofit activities to clean up degraded water bodies. Local governments are encouraged to take lead roles in public education efforts through public signage, storm drain marking, pollution prevention outreach campaigns, and partnerships with citizen groups and businesses. Citizens can help prioritize the clean-up strategies, volunteer to become involved in restoration efforts, and mark storm drains with approved "don't dump" messages.
